ARRIVAL OF THE RIO DE LA PLATA.

LANDING OF THE MINISTERS.

EXCITING SCENE ON THE MOLE-HEAD.

URQUIZA GOING UP.

The only spot in Buenos Ayres where there is any stir is at the stairs on the mole. A man may walk through every street in town and not see a single subject to attract notice, but even the dullest day in town there is always some novelty on the mole—emigrants landing, ministers coming ashore, soldiers going off, &c. Yesterday, however, the mole-head was unusually attractive, the leading politicians went down to meet the ministers, and we noticed some English gentlemen sauntering about, waiting evidently to welcome Consul Parish, who was expected back from the Banda Oriental. The Rio de la Plata steamed into the inner roads at 1 p.m., and all the whale-boats ran out to meet her, as her quarter-deck was literally black with passengers. As a matter of course the first arrivals were the ministers, who were pulled to the stairs in the Captain of the Port's boat: Dr. Rawson looked remarkably well, and as for Dr. Elizalde he seemed as if he had only made a trip to San Fernando with his friend Dn. J. C. Ocampo, he looked so remarkably well.

Things in Entre Rios, we are happy to say, are by no means so bad as was thought. The allied army is in good health and condition, Urquiza is about to visit President Mitre, and will go up in the Rio de la Plata from Concepcion to Concordia on Saturday. The Entre Rios have been cited by President Mitre to appear on the 1st of August. They will, we understand, be drafted into the Argentine army and officered by General Mitre, thus avoiding the possibility of another 'contretemps,' such as has occurred. The Paraguayans are not moving. The Brazilians had moved up to the north of Concordia.

Flores, with a force of several thousand men, had at last gone up the 'alto Uruguay,' with the object of cutting off the wing of the Paraguayan army. More Orientals were expected daily at Concordia.

We conversed with many Englishmen who came down in the steamer. They informed us that neither of the Ministers were sea-sick; that with the exception of some emigrant Orientals, the general feeling in Entre Rios was in favor of the allied cause, and that the Entre Rios soldiers were not so much to blame in the recent movement as some of the officers who commanded them.

The camps in the Banda Oriental are in splendid condition, and estancieros doing very well. It was rumored that a fellow named Eclugues had crossed over from Entre Rios into the Banda Oriental, had got together some ten or twelve gauchos, and was prowling about on the banks of the Rio Negro.

It was rumored in Concordia that the allied army was about to march to the Mirinai, in Corrientes. Bullock carts were in great demand.

The division from Gualeguaychú of Urquiza's army was the only division which did not disband.

Baron Tamandare was still in Concordia, but we hear will shortly come down to Buenos Ayres.

The divisions of Nogoya and Victoria have been cited to attend with leading horses, on the 1st August; the place of rendezvous is Victoria. The Paraguayans are said to be in the neighbourhood of Uruguayana.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

OUR URQUIZA CORRESPONDENT.

In order that you may have a peep behind the curtain at Urquiza and his grand army I send you two original

despatches. Depend upon it Paunero's threats are not made in vain, measures have been taken to inveigle Serrano into the trap; to-day or at furthest to-morrow he will fall in the snare; he need not look for any leniency from a drum-head court-martial, whose judges are selected by Paunero. If some of my statements have proved incorrect, for instance the firing into the Dotterell's boat, that rumor reached this during the stay of Lagragna and Paunero here; I made no account of it until squibs and rockets were being fired in profusion and beer drunk without limits; both Lagragna and Paunero joined in the merriment. They did not rejoice for the death of three Englishmen: all thought it would be the means of embroiling Paraguay with England. Many here believe that Urquiza is at the bottom of the affair of his army. They cite his treachery to Rosas, Virasoro, and others in support of their opinion. He is without doubt a false man. Our village will soon be deserted.

THE ARMIES IN CORRIENTES.

THE PARAGUAYAN WINTER-QUARTERS.

Very little change has taken place in the position of the belligerents during the last fortnight, and the dispersion of Urquiza's army seems to have had no effect on their movements or the plans of the campaign.

The enemy's vanguard under Robles continues at Empedrado, with outposts on the river San Lorenzo, the forces of Cáceres being on the south bank watching them. The neighbors report that the Paraguayans are busily constructing winter-quarters from Tabaco to Empedrado. Lopez is at Corrientes and the total force on the Paraná is estimated at 42 (not 24) thousand men.

Cáceres has his headquarters at Ambrosio, but we are ignorant of the number of his men. General Hornos sent 400 infantry south to join Paunero, and moved off his 2,000 cavalry to Garzas for change of pasture.

General Paunero with his division, 4,000 strong, was still at Puesto Medio on the river of Corrientes, on the 13th.

THE BRAZILIAN FLEET.

ANOTHER COMBAT EXPECTED.

The imperial fleet is at anchor five miles above Bella Vista, the Guardia Nacional is in that port, having suddenly come down the river with important despatches for Gen. Cáceres, and on her return the whole fleet would proceed up to Empedrado or Riachuelo. At the latter place the enemy has formed new batteries and stationed six steamers, prepared for a second combat with the Brazilian gunboats. The fine guns belonging to the Jequitinhonha have been mounted with several others on the 'barranca,' and the Paraguayans are endeavoring to get that vessel afloat. Admiral Barroso regrets having lost so fine a gunboat, but he was obliged to abandon her and come down the river, his fleet being short of coals and provisions, and several of his vessels needing repairs: the river also was falling. The Chaco Indians were very kind to the fleet, supplying beef and information, but the Paraguayans caught 25 of them and shot them right off, for which it is said the Indians are assembling several tribes to cross the river and invade Corrientes near Riachuelo. The Brazilians now get fresh beef at Bella Vista, and the Paraguayans having erected a new battery at La Merced, it will be necessary to force that pass in going up towards Riachuelo to fight their fleet and batteries there.

The Comandante Anstutzen murdered Cotapo at two o'clock this morning in the confiteria of Dn. Geronimo. He is now a prisoner in the 'comandancia,' guarded by drawn swords.

IMPORTANT COMMERCIAL DECISION.

THE QUESTION OF TRANSFER DEFINED.

Many of our readers will remember a subject which occupied a good deal of public attention about this time last year, just subsequent to the failure of Civallari Bros. & Co., and in reference thereto.

Civallari, within a few weeks of his stoppage, had transferred various goods deposited in the Custom-house to the London and River Plate Bank,

in pledge as security for advances, and when the failure took place several importing houses who had sold these articles to the bankrupts, commenced law-suits against the Bank to recover same. Many pretenses were alleged by the different plaintiffs for adopting this course, but we could never discover that any of them were founded either in law or equity, and at the time, though we sympathized with the hard case of some of the parties victimized by the bankrupts, we expressed very strong opinions on the subject, and prophesied the Bank would successfully defend its right to securities it had received in perfect good faith and in the ordinary course of business.

The result has proved we were correct. There were originally eight actions commenced against the Bank in connection with this matter, five of which were abandoned, and three went up for judgment. The sentence of the Court before which the cases were first tried, was in favor of the defendants; this was appealed against, and the suits were heard over again, before three judges sitting in Appeal, who on Monday unanimously confirmed the sentence of the Court below, ordering the goods to be immediately handed over to the Bank.

We congratulate the talented Manager on his success, and the commercial public are indebted to him for the spirited manner in which he has defended a principle, essentially sound in itself, and of the greatest importance to the commercial community of the River Plate.

One of the three cases referred to was the 600 barrels of American flour, claimed by an American house, on the ground that although a 'transferencia' had been given for them, placing them in Civallari's name in the Custom-house books, no actual delivery had taken place; this was manifestly incorrect, and the recent decisions confirm the almost universal opinion that prevailed, viz., that goods may be hypothecated and transferred from one party to another, by giving the usual titular transfer, just as legally as if the goods themselves were carted away, provided always that the transfer is registered in the Custom-house, and when this is done the delivery is complete. This is a point of no small importance to have settled, and again we congratulate the London and River Plate Bank on this very satisfactory result.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The British war steamer Stromboli towed out from Montevideo to the English bank at the mouth of the Plate, a new light-ship to replace the one lost. We have to thank the captain of the Stromboli for this valuable service.

The story published in all the papers about the attack on ex-President Aguirre, on the Brazilian coast when wrecked on board the Bear is, we are assured, false. A well known English gentleman tells us that Mr. Aguirre is at present living on the banks of the Uruguay, at a well known Saladero: our informant is about to leave for the Uruguay, and promises some spicy letters on the state of things up there. The rails on the Southern Railway are now laid down to within four leagues of Chascomus, another month and the trains will run through from town to Chascomus, the road will probably be open to public traffic before the farmers will have finished shearing their flocks.

Yesterday a bullock-cart was seen entering town conveying four fashionably dressed gentlemen who had gone outside for a day's sport. The state of the roads since the last rain baffles all description, and parties who wish to spend a day's shooting had better wait until the roads are better.

Mr. Claypole, we understand, has received 1 Patagonian ram and five sheep by the last vessel from Patagonia: some sheep farmers who have inspected the animals report most favorably on them, and one Irish estanciero from the North has taken such a fancy to this long woolled breed that he has ordered some Patagonian rams for his estancia; the wool is coarse but extremely long, and the breed is considered the hardest in the country.

The Tevere arrived yesterday from Montevideo with a full complement of passengers and a fair cargo. Our correspondent's letter will be found very

interesting, as there was a great alarm in the Montevideo about a mooted mutiny which never took place.

The Werner Concert, advertised to take place on the 24th inst., has been unavoidably postponed, owing to the sudden indisposition of Mr. Werner; we will duly advise the public when it will take place.

Our colleague the 'Tribuna' of Montevideo, appeared on the 18th all printed in blue ink, it being the day of Independence of that country; the extraordinary appearance of the paper all in blue has more a tinge of the ridiculous than sublime in it.

We regret to notice the demise of Canon Boneo of the Cathedral: he was a talented divine and much respected in the city.

A friend of ours lost 7,000\$ yesterday, and begs us to call attention to his notice in the advertising column.

Horse-stealing, as a subscriber informs us, is now prevalent in Matanzas, owing to the loose characters clearing out, to avoid enlistment.

The Cordoba contingent left that city on the 8th, 500 strong: 200 having mutinied some night, the remaining 300 are on march for Rosario.

The Brazilian vice-consul at Paraná has got into a great trouble, for refusing to hoist his flag on the national anniversary, 9th of July.

Mme. Gorriti, widow of Gen. Belzu, has placed herself at the head of a new counter-revolution in Bolivia, and is fortifying La Paz. She is a native of Buenos Ayres.

Mr. Parker, the well-known land and sheep agent, whose office is at the corner of calles Piedad and Reconquista, requests us to say that for many years he has not had on his books such a number of splendid estancias on sale both in this and the adjoining provinces, as at present. He has also flocks of the best mestiza sheep in every partido for sale, at very moderate prices. Mr. Parker's books merit inspection by our newly arrived countrymen who are about to embrace the sheepfarming business.

We perceive in the list of persons who have recently given horses to the Govt. for service on the frontier the name of Mr. Edward Musgrave, of the Guardia del Monte who is only recently established in the country.

The 'Pueblo' states that some revolutionary characters, Carlos Angel and another, have recently had an interview with Urquiza in Entre Rios and then crossed the Paraná at the Paso of the 'Diamante.' The Governor of Santa Fé ought to keep a sharp look out after such characters.

Dr. Fleury, the renowned beef-curer in the Uruguay, has kindly favored us with some samples of his meat. We have not as yet tried it, but when we do we will advise our readers as to its quality. Corned beef for an editor's table must be very good to be digested.

The importation of poverty still continues. All the small river boats that arrive now from up the rivers bring deck loads of cocks and hens, which sell here at most remunerative prices.

The American Church School is about to give a concert, and for tickets to it we return our thanks; it is to occur at the Church on Friday evening; we learn that it is got up by the Literary Society connected with the School called 'the League of Truth'; after the seating of the School and its patrons, the few seats remaining are already taken, so that no more tickets of admission can be obtained.

As an instance of the great changes in trade in the River Plate, we call attention to the fact that, the largest article of import in former years from the States—American flour is now completely unknown in Buenos Ayres, whilst on the other hand a new article of consumption has been introduced, which threatens to become ere long one of the greatest import staples in the River Plate—Kerosene, every vessel now from the States brings hundreds of thousands of gallons of this necessary liquid, whilst a barrel of American flour is a thing unknown.

Coal is rising so fearfully in price that shortly all our readers will be obliged to burn wood. We hear that by retail it sells for \$300 m.c. per ton.

The Kepler is posted to leave to-day: we bid Captain Carroll a kind farewell and hope on his next trip out to the River Plate he will not forget to bring us some of the latest papers: for every

late newspaper he brings us we promise him ten passengers and when the war is over a couple of bales of cotton on freight.

Mr. Ascasubi, who arrived out in the Carmel from Europe, has been ordered back again to send out one thousand more soldiers. Now these recruits cost the country about £70 each man. If President Mitre would only send a commission to Dublin we promise to get recruits and land them here at almost half Mr. Ascasubi's estimate, and we may be excused in remarking that if Mediterranean recruits are worth £70, Irishmen are cheap at £100. At least Napoleon, Napier, Grant, Lee and the Czar will admit this although General Mitre might question.

There is, we are told by our country friends, a regular stampede amongst the Gauchos; on every road in camp, are seen these fellows clearing out since the last order for enrolment has been made known. The Provincial Government has very properly issued a decree ordering all the judges to seize these runaways, and send them into town.

Another lottery boy is gone, he was well known in town, supposed to have had a large amount of ready cash about him besides lottery tickets. Small boys are now beginning to get nervous about selling tickets, and we suppose it is for this reason, so many strong able bodied men have taken to this business.

It will interest our readers to learn that the 'Drabble Row' side walk, is about to be adopted by a wealthy house proprietor in the Southern district of town, where indeed it has for years been much required.

Private advices received per Esmeralda, state that the Brazilian squadron was about to attack a Paraguayan battery erected at Bella Vista: we confess we are surprised that the gallant vice admiral Barroso has not gone up to Corrientes and cut out and captured or destroyed the ten Paraguayan steamers said to exist in the port of Corrientes.

Our friend Mr. Gimenez, whose cotton plantation at the Vatel in Corrientes promised so well, is at present up there: he will probably return by next steamer when we hope to be able to give our readers a graphic and true picture of the state of things in the centre of Corrientes.

MONTEVIDEAN CORRESPONDENCE.

July 17, 1865.

Yesterday being Sunday, we had a grand 'funcion' in the Cathedral to celebrate the consecration of Don Jacinto Vera, Lord Bishop in partibus [one of my reverend friends calls him Lord Bishop, limited], for the see of this Republic, without, as I am told, a diocese. And when the mitred lord of the Oriental Church came forth, accompanied by the officiating Bishop, Dr. Escalada, the grand organ pealed forth its 'Veni Creator,' accompanied by a fine orchestra band of music.

Though the church was not so crowded as might have been expected, yet the attendance was not small, and the heat in the church was at any rate quite overpowering. Every one was struggling and striving to catch a glimpse of the new dignitary of the ecclesiastical hierarchy, and the crush of rustling dresses and fluttering fans announced that the fair sex was fairly represented within the sacred precincts of the Cathedral.

All kinds of rumors are rife in town, most of them of a very unfavorable character, whose suspicious origin leads people to suspect them as mere 'bolas.' Such, for instance, is the reported capture of the Paraguayan fleet; the insurrection of the province of Santa Fé; the invitation of General Mitre to General Solano Lopez for an interview to arrange the question. Of course, no sensible person gives credence to such reports, which are begotten of the ardent desires of the friends in this city of Marshal Solano.

I am sorry to say that the news recently received in town with regard to the tragedy enacted on Messrs. Wilcken's estancia reports the death of the peon, who, your readers will recollect, was badly wounded by a pistol-shot in the leg. is still at liberty in Paysandú. Though the weight of circumstantial evidence goes with telling force against him, the authorities have contented themselves with assigning him the limits of the town as the boundary of his prison. I notice an important sale of Angola goats, imported of the best breeds, from the Cape of Good Hope, effected by Mr. Herbert, to two of our foreign estancieros. The goats are of remarkably fine quality, and are at present, to the number of nearly 250, on view at Gomez's stables.

The sale effected by General Moreno to Mr. George Bell, of the estancia of the former gentleman in La Colonia, was made at 17,800 dollars a 'suerte.'

There is only one sale of land that has in this country realized a higher price than that purchased by Mr. Bell.

Our present Minister of Finance, Sr. Juan Ramon Gomez, sold a small quantity of land near San José, a short time since, at the rate of 20,000 dollars a 'suerte!'

Business generally is a little more active, though the importing houses complain of the slowness of sales.

The 'Reforma Pacifica' had its editor, a Spaniard, condemned to six months' imprisonment for publishing a seditious article in the paper. The editor's counsel has appealed against the decision of the jury. In the meantime, the same paper has been accused by the director of the 'Siglo' for an article, in which it was affirmed that the 'Siglo' was 'subventioned' by Government.

It seems that the gentlemen at the 'Reforma's' head-quarters are getting into hot-water, and are likely to be scalded. However, these defenders of Paraguay and its illustrious ruler seem to have made up their minds to imitate Don Quixote and hold their own in the political tournament against all now comers. In the meantime the Government holds its hands and remains an impassive spectator of the jousts.

The foregoing lines were intended for sending by the Uruguay [steamship] that left our port for your city yesterday.

I have little more to add. Notwithstanding all the idle reports to the contrary, the parade, 'Te Deum,' and 'Vivac,' with the customary 'carne con cuero,' have passed over very quietly. The attendance of ladies, however, owing to the alarming rumors of a threatened insurrection, carefully propagated by the enemies of our tranquillity the day before, was but small. Many, of course, were deterred from taking part in the 'funcion' from fear of what might happen.

To-day some 2,000 men were brought together under arms. These consisted of three battalions of National Guards, the corps of 'Extra Muros' and Artillery, and Sr. Bustamante's corps of volunteers. This last, numbering 200 men, is really an efficient looking body—well-dressed, and, generally speaking, men of good stature.

Owing to a reputed discovery of arms concealed in the Cordon, the streets were patrolled by cavalry pickets during the night.

I am sorry to say I have to add to what I mentioned about the 'Reforma Pacifica,' another incident which certainly when known will not tend to dissipate the bad opinion held generally of this paper.

As your readers are aware, it has been incumbent on me, from time to time, to make reference to the 'Reforma' in terms far from eulogistic.

What your correspondent has felt compelled to protest against, is that indulgence in personalities which led him to criticize the conduct of the 'Siglo' and the 'Tribuna.' Only the 'Reforma,' as attacking the Government and speaking in favor of Paraguay, does an injury to the country, and those whose interests are bound up with it.

LONDON AND BRAZILIAN BANK.

An extraordinary general meeting of the shareholders was held yesterday at the London Tavern: Mr. Cater in the chair, for the purpose of considering with a view to their confirmation of certain resolutions which were agreed to at a meeting held on the 11th of May last.

The Secretary having read the resolutions, The Chairman proposed that they be confirmed, and said he should be happy to answer any question respecting them.

A Shareholder inquired whether Baron Maua came into the bank on the same terms with themselves—that was to say with a subscribed capital of about one million and a half, whilst they subscribed one million: and whether he paid £7. 10s. a share in money or negotiable securities as the shareholders of the bank paid.

The Chairman replied that Baron Maua entered as a partner 'pari passu' with themselves, he and his colleagues having three-fifths, and the shareholders of the company holding two-fifths of the capital at £7. 10s. per share. Some persons were disposed to ask what inducement the Baron could have to come into the concern. He had the inducement of placing such a concern as his in safe custody, and participating in the profits they made. It was a give and take arrangement, and he thought it ought to be satisfactory to all parties.

In reply to further questions, The Chairman said there was no limit to the circulation of the bank, except that for every £750,000 of notes issued they should have £250,000 in specie; but he hoped the circulation would not exceed the wants of the country. There was no objection to issuing a pamphlet containing the terms of the agreement, and a report of the last two meetings.

The motion was then agreed to and the meeting separated.

P.,—a near relative of the great Emperor Napoleon III.,—is spoken of as likely to come forward as a candidate for this city, so long represented by his father,' announces itself "in a position to state that the Emperor has performed a most kind and generous act of late towards Mr. Wyse, in defraying the liabilities of his paternal property, satisfying all the claims thereon of

his mother, Madame Wyse. This noble act," continues the journal in question, "leaves Mr. Wyse sole and unfettered possessor of his valuable estates." Madame Wyse is full cousin of the Emperor, being the daughter of his uncle Lucien. Sir Thomas Wyse, her late husband, was British Ambassador at Athens.

The Earl of Minto, the Countess of Russel, and Lady Dunfermline, have just lost their youngest brother, Lieutenant-Colonel the Hon. Gilbert Elliot, who died on the 25th, at Hastings, after a long illness. The gallant officer was the youngest son of Gilbert, second Earl of Minto, and was born 23rd February, 1826. We believe he was also a near relative of Admiral Elliot, now on this station.

It is stated that Miss Gladstone, sister to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, has subscribed £1,000 towards the Wiseman testimonial, that she will give a similar sum for ten years to come, and that she has further promised to give £1,000 a year towards the augmentation of the income of the new Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster.
